Till was a fourteen year old who got murdered in the 1900s by a couple of men. The boy was brutally murdered and his mom decided to have an open casket to show the rest of the people what racism looked like. At the memorial, they had the original casket in which Emmett was buried and it was really sad to see it.

I think that as I learn more about history,

myself, and our communities I'm becoming more self-aware of what goes on and also what goes on with myself. Self-awareness is key to having a growth mindset.






Saturday, June 28
