About



Between four to six current CAMP students or HEP graduates in their first year at a post-secondary institution are selected to participate in the National HEP/CAMP Association Internship Program.

The High School Equivalency Program (HEP) and the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) have existed since 1967 and 1972, respectively.

HEP and CAMP are educational programs which serve students from migrant or seasonal farm-worker families. HEP helps students who have dropped out of high school get their High School Equivalency Credential, and serves more than 6,000 students annually. CAMP assists students in their first year of college with academic, personal, and financial support. CAMP serves approximately 2,400 migrant participants annually. Overall, nearly three-quarters of all CAMP students graduate with baccalaureate degrees.

These two programs, which have achieved stunning success rates since their inception, are funded through grants from the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Migrant Education and are administered by universities, colleges and non-profit organizations nationwide.

The National HEP/CAMP Association is an organization whose membership is comprised of universities, colleges and non-profit organizations that administer a High School Equivalency Program (HEP) and/or a College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP). The Association's membership is committed to improving the quality and effectiveness of the national HEP and CAMP program, all HEP and CAMP projects, and to disseminating information about HEP and CAMP.



HEPCAMP DC Internship

The National HEPCAMP Association sponsors in terms each year who are placed with various offices in Washington DC. This is a once-in-a-lifetime experience for CAMP students.

This year four to six current CAMP students or HEP graduates in their first year at a post-secondary institution will be selected to participate in the National HEP/CAMP Association Internship Program. The participants will travel to Washington, D.C. to take part in a ten-week internship. Expected internship placements include congressional offices, the Office of Migrant Education, United Farm Workers, United States Department of Agriculture, and the Congressional Hispanic Leadership Institute (CHLI).

National HEPCAMP Association Scholarship

National HEP/CAMP Association Scholarship awards are for students who have earned an HSE (high school equivalency) through a HEP program AND who are enrolled in an institution of higher education (IHE) or other post-secondary education or training program.

Student Emergency Fund (SEF)

The National HEP CAMP Association recognizes we are currently in unprecedented and challenging times and our students are faced with a multitude of unexpected issues.

Students experiencing financial need due to an emergency may be eligible to receive one-time, per calendar year, emergency funding of up to \$599.00.

Eligibility

Eligible students for SEF funds must be either currently served in HEP/CAMP or recent alumni who are completing their undergraduate program.

For the purposes of this fund, an emergency is defined as a financial hardship within the academic school year, such as a medical issue, accident, child care, or emergency such as fire, flood, unexpected death, victim of a crime etc.


Funds will not be granted to students who request funding to cover tuition, fees or books, non-essential utilities, debt/owed payments.

Workshop Description:

Everyone has a unique identity, personality and style. Most people also have ideas of what characteristics they desire in their leaders. Whether you are a current leader or an aspiring leader, this workshop will serve as a thought-provoking and introspective space for you to explore your own leadership style, and consider strategies to maximize your leadership in your work and life. At the conclusion of this session, you will have a clear sense of the type of leader you desire to be, and confidence in the positive impact you can have on those around you.



Dr. Dwayne Cantrell is the Associate Vice President of Enrollment Management and Chief Enrollment Officer at California State University, Bakersfield (CSUB). The Division of Enrollment consists of 14 departments which attract, admit, enroll, retain, and graduate students and is committed to providing access and support for student success. For nearly 30 years, Dr. Cantrell has held a variety of leadership roles within both K-12 and higher educational institutions, including three of the four systems of higher education in California. He also worked in the corporate sector for Coca-Cola and provided consulting services for Nike and E2K (San Francisco 49ers Entertainment).

Prior to his arrival at CSUB, Dr. Cantrell served for 10 years at California State University, Northridge where he provided senior leadership and strategic direction for programs and services that supported access and student success from the point of application for admission to graduation from the campus. He also maintained an active role in teaching, publishing, and presenting on a variety of issues related to leadership, student development, team building, and personal growth. For the past 12 years, Dr. Cantrell has been an active leader and member of the Bakersfield community. He serves on the Boards of Directors on three different organizations including The Mission at Kern County (Bakersfield Rescue Mission) and serves as the Senior Pastor of Living Victory Church. He also serves as the Wellness Coach for the Bakersfield College Football team.

Dr. Cantrell holds an Ed.D. in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies from CSU Northridge, a Th.D. (Doctor of Theology) from Summit Bible College, a M.A. in Theology from Fuller Theological Seminary, and an M.A. in Education with an emphasis on counseling and student personnel from San Jose State University.

Ernesto Mejia, the proud son of Mexican immigrants, is a true example of the American dream. Diagnosed with the rare disease of Guillain-Barré Syndrome at the age of 16 that left him temporarily paralyzed, he was not supposed to be a successful student, much less a College Dean of Students.

Through his hardships, Ernesto learned to never give up on life, he now speaks to students, parents, and teachers about overcoming obstacles and never giving up on the American dream: education.

Workshop Description: This two-part workshop will address the myth that students dislike participating, sharing, or talking about their feelings. Participants will learn various activities, energizers, and icebreakers that can be implemented while having fun, creating a safe space, and encouraging fruitful dialogue. Understanding how to deliver these activities is one part of the equation. However, learning how to facilitate the dialogues that follow activities will ensure we are successful in our ability to engage students, parents, and the professionals that serve them.



Natasha Carrizosa CoolSpeak

Natasha Carrizosa is a teacher, poet, writer, author, MC – master of ceremonies, keynote speaker, facilitator, and spoken word artist. She amazes her audience as she speaks about the beauty and appreciation of the diversity that lives within us all.

She is the daughter of an African-American mother and Mexican immigrant father. Her book, *Crown*, is all about being your authentic self, overcoming adversity, mindfulness, and self-care, spirituality, motherhood, teenage life, gratitude, hopes & dreams, and growing up different (roots) from bullying to self-actualization (crown).

Her love for the arts inspired the creation of Natty Roots & Rhyme, one of the most dynamic poetry open mics in the country.

Mental Health and Suicide Awareness and Prevention in the Latinx/Hispanic Community Length: 90 minutes

In this role, she coordinates with the PSI HiSET Program teams, the HiSET Board, state directors and administrators, adult education providers, test centers, employers, and higher education institutions. Tanya also serves as the main point of contact for national organizations such as Coalition on Adult Basic Education (COABE) and National Association of State Directors of Adult Education (NASDAE).

Tanya's team is directly responsible for HiSET contracts and partnerships, the HiSET suite of products, and adult education outreach. She oversees the HiSET webinars and conferences to keep professional development and program updates accessible. For more than 20 years, she has demonstrated her commitment to education by the various positions she has held in the industry and by her active community service.



Griseli AvilaHiSET Regional Site Supervisor

Griseli Avila is Regional Site Supervisor for the HiSET Program in California, she works alongside the test centers to make sure they have what they need to ensure success in the classroom. Griseli received her MBA at Kennesaw State University making her the first college graduate in her family.

Before HiSET, Griseli was working with the California State Bar Association coordinating bar exams for the state. During her free time, she plays in an adult soccer league with her husband and coaches u8 girls on the weekends. In Atlanta she does volunteer at the Hispanic Alliance in Georgia and is always there to lend a helping hand.

Guadalupe Martinez Zapata

State of Oregon Board of Education

Tuesday, October 31st, 2023

Guadalupe Martinez Zapata is one of six siblings and the daughter of farmworker parents with the highest aspirations and regard for education and civism. Guadalupe inherited this love and commitment to education and service and has made a life-long career of finding pathways of accessibility and equity for nontraditional student populations. Her firsthand experience with marginalization and being the parent of a biracial child have strengthened her advocacy for parents and students of color. Her greatest motivation, her son Diego, recently completed his baccalaureate degree in mathematics at Howard University.

Guadalupe has been a college instructor at several institutions of higher education in Oregon for over 23 years. She has served as full-time faculty in the Counseling Department at Clackamas Community College since 2000, as well as teaching Chican@/Latinx studies at Portland State University. Prior to instruction, Guadalupe worked in student services administration at Oregon State University, University of Oregon and California State University, Chico.

Guadalupe led the Oregon Leadership Institute for Latinx youth in the Clackamas Community College service district for seven years, graduating over 100 young leaders and providing peer and academic mentoring to each. She has been invited to speak and conduct trainings on issues of Latinx history, Chicana feminism, equity, and access to higher education at several local and regional conferences, including the Cesar Chavez Leadership Conference, The Student Success and Retention Conference,

TedxPacificUWomen Talk, and the Women of Color Community Empowerment Conference at PCC, Rock Creek. Lupita, as her mother insisted people call her, served on the Oregon State University Alumni Association Board and the Clackamas County OSU Extension Board. She is currently a director on the board for Embold Federal Credit Union, and the Chair of the Oregon State Board of Education.

Ms. Martinez obtained her bachelor's and master's degrees from Oregon State University, where she was a CAMP student, and subsequently a CAMP Academic Counselor while she worked on her master's degree.

Wednesday, November 1st, 2023

At age 17, Trino migrated from Michoacán, México, to Washington state, the Yakima Valley, to be more precise. Apple, pears, cherry, and hop fields surround the Yakima Valley. Trino worked as an apple picker and pruner at different orchards. Trino enrolled in the HEP program offered by the University of Oregon and took ESL (English as a Second language) courses while working in the apple fields.

Inspired by the momentum, Trino continued with college courses and earned an AA at Yakima Valley College. Then, he decided to continue with higher education and enrolled at Heritage University, and in 2005 he attained a Social Worker degree.

Today, Trino is a Social Worker, author, and motivational speaker. Who promotes education as the tool of success in life. During his workshops, Trino motivates students and adults to aim high when pursuing their dreams—over 100 presentations at Universities, colleges, high schools, and National and State Migrant conferences nationwide. Trino has presented in Mexico and Colombia and traveled to Italy, Canada, and Germany.

His two books, "Cuando la noche se nos viene encima" and "El regreso del Colibri," are essential to not giving up on your dreams.



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


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
